

# Wyoming Women's Issues Survey 2004

Respondents = 1011

Questions are presented as they appeared in the telephone survey. Following each question, in parenthesis is the abbreviated variable name used in the electronic data file. Raw frequency counts are shown for all response categories. Results shown under "Valid Percent" are based solely on non-missing cases, excluding Don't Know, No Answer, and System Missing. "System Missing" refers to households that were not asked a particular question because of a logical skip in the interviewing program. (For example, respondents reporting that they do not personally experience any problems with a particular issue were not asked further questions regarding that issue.) Responses with an asterisk to the left are flagged as outliers; these responses are so extreme that they may indicate a misunderstanding of the question (for example, reporting annual cost when asked about monthly costs).

- There is no transportation anywhere in this state. When Amtrak pulled out, it was real bad. People cannot get anywhere without a car. There is no mental health care here that is reliable. We are losing all our good doctors.
- There is such a high suicide rate that needs more programs and the insurance rates are ridiculous.
- There should be care for veterans in state because I have to go to Utah. Give us old folks a break.
- They need to revise their stalking and protection order laws. They do not work.
- They need to run the buses in Gillette on weekends as well.
- They should have more low-income housing for divorced parents or more affordable housing.
- This is the most fun survey I have ever taken.  
Too many women in our community don't have health care or health insurance; low paid and can't afford it; these women are not willing to further educate themselves.
- Uninsurable status is discrimination (people born handicapped for example) because the cost is so outrageous they cannot afford help.
- Used to be an adult probation and parole agent; believe there are serious drug and alcohol problems with women in my community.
- Wage discrimination in Wyoming; services for single mothers; child care and infant care.
- Wage discrimination is really a problem in Wyoming. Women are very much underpaid for what they do.

- We have our problems and everyone else might have worse ones.
- We need more things for kids to do in this state. The kids and the prisoners should all either be in school the whole time - we should be sending our younger prisoners into war instead of our boys so they can come home and help their families.
- We need socialized medicine like Canada and England and more voters voting in every election.
- We need someone to standardize rules about child support issues.
- We need support here for children that are on drugs.
- We try to help out the single mothers.
- Why aren't people voting?
- Wish there were more jobs for woman and people in general in Wyoming.
- Women actually speaking up.
- Women are not paid what they are worth in the workforce in Wyoming and the nation as a whole.
- Women are so scared because they don't know that they can go anywhere confidential for help with abuse or substance abuse problems. There is no where that it wouldn't get around except for the coalition, which I run, and the funding has been cut so low.
- Women in the state of Wyoming are not paid enough here and the men are paid more than women; Wyoming is the worst in the nation and we need to change that.
- Women need more emotional support and we need more abortion services in the state.
- Women need somewhere to go to when they are having family difficulties.
- Women should take care of their own children and they shouldn't work outside the home.
- Women who don't qualify for help like TANF, etc and who need it is a problem.
- Women with kids when they're victims of domestic violence need more assistance from the court systems.
- Women's freedom of choice and women's freedom to obtain birth control.
- Wyoming's salary cap for women is way too low.
